

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

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Aleet the King's by Kathleen Noble of Wylie

ong ago fairy tales always began the same way ~ Once upon a time...

Each of them make-believe stories, set within magical kingdoms in faraway lands where most anything was possible. Plain orange pumpkins became proverbial golden carriages, mice turned to coachmen, and lovely young maidens awaited handsomely regal princes to kiss them awake or fit them with fabled sparkling slippers.

Common to all folklore a prince arrived gallantly on horseback to claim his princess and the two ride into a captivating sunset to live out their well-written happily ever after destinies safely within palace walls.

A bit of a modern day fairy tale is unfolding in a lovely Wylie manor for a young King family. A true to life story-book romance with a computer age twist; Trever King and Jenna Winder met online in January 2004. So the two could be together, Trever relocated from the Austin area in May, they were engaged in September and wed March 2005. The King's, the epitome of a twenty first century couple, are raising an enchanting eighteen month old princess: the beautiful Eva Renee who was born to them in July 2007.

Their story isn't imaginary. The characters and events are real but the story is mystically full of every ingredient necessary for an age old fairy tale classic.

The discovery of an unimaginable magnitude came in July 2008. The King's would be welcoming quadruplets in April 2009. In their wildest dreams, the twenty-three year old Jenna had spoken hopefully of wanting five children someday; while Trever, 27 envisioned perhaps a more manageable three. "I guess Jenna won," laughed Trever.

Trever & Tenna

In October, sixteen weeks into the pregnancy Jenna was placed on strict and total bed rest; allowed to rise for only bathroom and shower needs. At just twenty three weeks gestation Jenna's pregnancy measured that of a full term single baby pregnancy.

"December 30th we arrived at the doctor's office for a regularly scheduled visit. We expected nothing more than the same information we'd received every week since the beginning of the pregnancy ~ size, measurements, weight, blood pressure checks, admonishments to continue on bed rest, going over concerns, complaints; but we got so much more," said Jenna. "During the examination the doctor discovered a bulge in the amniotic sac of one of the babies. The doctor admitted Jenna explaining they'd do all they could to delay the inevitable onset of labor. In spite of monumental effort to do so Jenna began having contractions" added Trever.

Bounding into the world at only twenty five weeks gestation a short twelve hours later in order of birth were Parker, Dahlia, Preston and Madelyn King; the perfect combination of princes and princesses. One pound 12 ounce Parker Elden, one pound 11 ounce Dahlia Colleen and one pound 12 ounce Preston Wayne came into the world at 9:33 p.m. with Madelyn Lila making her entry one minute later. In the period of two minutes the world changed, and the King family increased from three to an unbelievable seven.

Preston, Parker, Dahlia and Madelyn are fraternal or multizygotic quadruplets; meaning they developed from four unique egg/sperm combinations.

They arrived via Cesarean section delivery to four sets of four member medical teams consisting of a doctor, nurse, respiratory therapist and anesthetist. Under the watchful eyes of hospital staff and a team of caring doctors the babies slept in separate incubators.

Madelyn and Dahlia, just now allowed to wear clothing, remain attached to monitors and wires one would rather imagine as jewels and adornments befitting precious fair young maidens. Brave masters Parker's and Preston's little bodies yield medical tubing resembling the badges of honor they've battled to earn. "Each of them is such a fighter and defying all the odds," brag both Trever and Jenna.

"Parker is so active and is constantly kicking and stretching his little body, and Preston works so hard at everything. He looks so much like Trever with his golden hair," offered Jenna. "Madelyn always appears to be smiling. She looks just like Jenna and has Jenna's dark complexion and hair; while Dahlia is the quiet observer and responds immediately to the sounds of our voices," said Trever. "They all love to hold on to our fingers and try so hard to not let go," added Jenna.

Both parents visit the babies' twice daily everyday to participate as much as is possible in the care of their children.

During that time Jenna administers Kangaroo Care; a skin to skin contact method between mother and child used to restore the unique mother-infant bond following a sudden separation during the birth experience particularly in premature births. The term Kangaroo Care was chosen to describe this strategy because the method is similar to how a baby kangaroo is carried in its mother's pouch. Kangaroo's are born after a gestation period of only 31-36 days and spend their remaining gestation period of between 180 to 300 days tucked safely within their mothers pouch. It is estimated that more than 82 percent of U.S. neonatal intensive care units are now using the Kangaroo Care method. Researchers have found that close physical contact with the parent helps to stabilize the pre-term infant's heartbeat, temperature, and breathing. Pre-term infants often have difficulty coordinating their breathing and heart rates.

"We try very hard to schedule our time with the babies around Eva. She has done so well adjusting to the constant coming and going. We try to see the babies during her naptime and when she goes to bed in the evening so she doesn't feel like we are always leaving her," said Jenna. "Eva definitely knows things have changed; especially since Mommy doesn't have her "ball" anymore," Jenna added.

Although each baby has endured medical conditions and necessary treatments common in micro preemie births such as the need for nasal cannulas, ventilators, and continuous

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


positive airway pressure treatments their prognosis is excellent. According to Trever all the children had patent ductiz arteriosis or PDA, a common condition seen in babies born so early. The valve that connects the two chambers of the heart doesn't fully close. Often the condition is correctable with drugs but Madelyn, Preston and Parker required surgery. Dahlia, Parker and Madelyn have each experienced bouts of pneumonia and Preston has experienced life threatening problems with kidney function. As is the way of fairy tales, the doctors in this ongoing epic are optimistic. The King quads continue to fight and to overcome the odds daily.

"The prognosis' for all the babies is excellent. It's all scary of course and is a roller coaster ride of emotion, worry, exhilaration and euphoria. We pray a lot and we ask God for strength and stamina. We are fortunate for knowledgeable doctors and amazing medical professionals and for the support of our families, our friends and church families," admits both Trever and Jenna." The doctors tell us to plan for an April homecoming. Which seems ironic since the original due date for the babies was April 14th," added Trever.

With the combination of their strong faith and the enormous love the Kings have for Parker, Preston, Madelyn, Dahlia and little Eva...they are expecting nothing short of their own personal ~ Happily ever after.

The Birds & The Bees

Talk to your kids about sex

hen parents hear the question, "Mommy and daddy, where do babies come from?", it can lead to an awkward discussion about sex. It's important to be prepared to talk about this topic with your children at any age, especially since it's inevitable that they'll pick up information about sex on television, on the playground or in school.

Keep it Simple for Younger Children

It's natural for young children to be curious about their own bodies, so it's normal for them to ask questions at an early age. The information you give your kids should be age-appropriate. When they are young (5 years of age or younger), it's best to keep your answers short yet truthful. For example, give them a simple explanation that they can understand such as "babies grow in a special place inside their mommy." You don't need to explain the act of lovemaking - they won't be able to understand the concept.

Open a Dialogue

As they grow older, it's appropriate to talk about the human anatomy of males and females. Use correct anatomical words rather than slang. You can explain that babies begin to grow when a mother's egg combines with a father's sperm. If your child sees something on TV or in a movie, you can use that as an opportunity to open a dialogue about sex. Be sure to listen

to their thoughts and feelings and make them feel comfortable talking to you, not embarrassed.

Address Tougher Topics With Preteens/Teens


During their preteen/middle school years, talk to them about puberty so they aren't worried or afraid when their bodies begin changing. Children ages 13 and older can handle heavier topics, including sexual intercourse, relationships, birth control and sexually transmitted diseases. Educate them about risky behavior and both the physical and emotional consequences of being sexually active.

Show Them You Care

Talking about sex also gives you an excellent opportunity to express your morals and values. At the same time, it's important to show your children that you trust their judgment and you respect their privacy. Remember that communication is key. Studies have shown that teens who have talked to their parents about sex are more likely to wait longer to begin hav-

ing sex or to practice abstinence. So although talking about the birds and the bees can be difficult and uncomfortable, it's a topic you don't want to shy away from. By communicating openly and honestly, you can help guide them to make healthy choices. •



ood, restaurants and dining out are a huge part of our American culture. On a typical day in America more than 130 million individuals will be foodservice patrons. There are approximately 945,000 restaurants in the United States with gross sales of \$566 billion that employ about 13 million people...that's 9% of the workforce! All of this adds up to an economic impact that is expected to exceed \$1.5 trillion dollars this year. Add to this the fact that the restaurant industry is expected to add 1.8 million jobs over the next decade, with employ-

ment reaching 14.8 million by 2019. Restaurants and foodservice offer our young people a tremendous opportunity for an excellent career. This is why the Wylie High School Culinary Arts program exists. And the goal of providing our students an industry-based career preparation program is thriving!

WHS started its Culinary Arts program about 12 years ago with just a few sections offered. In the fall of 2003 Chef Steve DeShazo was hired, by then principal Dr. T.J. Theisen to take over the program. Chef DeShazo is a five year veteran of the U.S. Navy, where he served as a cook aboard the USS Guadalcanal (LPH-7). He has

over 20 years experience as a chef and manager, most recently owning a catering company in Dallas that, among other things, served as the "personal chef" to the Dallas Mavericks. "When Dr. Theisen hired me I told her that I wanted to create the most innovative high school culinary program around," says DeShazo. "And the Wylie ISD administration has supported me every step of the way."

His goal has succeeded. Every year more high schools start culinary arts programs and most of them base their programs on the WHS model. In fact, in 2004, there were only 4 high schools in the DFW area that had a culinary program. Now there are over 25! This speaks to the incredible opportunity that our students here in Wylie have to get a great start to an excellent career.

The program at Wylie High School is centered on a student-operated restaurant and catering operation called Pirate Cove Café. The café is open to the public for breakfast and lunch 3 days a week, usually on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 7:45-9:10 and 11:45-1:40 and serves from a full menu of over 20 lunch items including soups, salads, sandwiches, hot entrees, side dishes and delicious daily dessert specials. Breakfast offerings include made to order omelets, breakfast quesadillas,

scratch-prepared muffins, biscuits and pancakes and many other standard breakfast items. When first-time patrons feast their eyes on the amazing menu they cannot believe that the restaurant is run exclusively by high school students! And the ambiance and mood lighting in the dining room make you feel like you are in a real restaurant... except for the whiteboard on the wall!

In addition to a busy breakfast and lunch service the student staff also provides catering services to events both in the district and in the

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community. Some of these events include providing buffet service in the football stadium at every home game, catering the annual dinner for the Christian Care Center volunteers, providing hors d'oeuvres and service for the AFJROTC Military Ball each December, catering the Band Banquet every spring and many

All of these activities add up to on the job training that is unmatched by any other opportunity that is out there. WHS Culinary students are participating in a controlled learning environment where they can perform complex tasks without any of the pressure or fear of failure. "I remember a lesson from my business management class in college when I learned the three important rules when managing a staff," says

DeShazo. "First, give them the skills they need to do the job. Second, give them the tools they need to do the job. Third, empower them to do the job. These are the same rules I use when I am training my students."

It appears to be working. Every year WHS Culinary graduates earn tens of thousands of dollars in scholarships from many sources. And in just a few short years there is already

a list of graduates from this impressive program who have gone out and made their career goals a reality. Mike Kown, a 2005 WHS graduate, has graduated from The Culinary Institute of America, completed his externship at The Mandarin Hotel in Singapore and is currently pursuing his Bachelor of Business Administration degree from UTD. Class of 2007 graduate Alysia Wier currently is completing her externship from Le Cordon Bleu at Disney World in Orlando, and Class of 2008 graduate Austin McManus is using his skills as a cook in the U.S. Marine Corps with plans to attend The Culinary Institute of America after serving his country. In all, Chef DeShazo is tracking 16 former students who have decided on a career as food service professionals and the list is growing bigger every year.

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
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everal years ago the community of Wylie got together to build a little playground. Well, maybe it's not so little, but the com-

The structure is built of wood and composite lumber. Why wood you ask? Because we could build a lot more playground for the \$125,000 we raised. Avoiding Dog Bites

Steps to teach your kids

eaching children how to relate to animals is very important. 4.7 million people in the United States are bitten by dogs yearly. 80% of the dog bites are from dogs they know and interact with on a regular basis. Estimation is that more than half are children under the age of 13. Children are at least 3 times more likely than adults to sustain a serious dog bite.




Children get excited around dogs and they move quickly, talk loudly and try to hug the dogs. All of this needs to be avoided. Even your friendliest dog can be uncomfortable with these quick movements and loud noises.

Here are some steps to teach children to help them be good friends with dogs.


Avoiding Dog Bites

- 1. Always ask permission before you pet a dog.
- 2. After being giving approval to pet the dog
 - a. Approach the dog slowly and quietly
- b. Let the dog sniff you
- c. Pet gently on the dog's sides or back
- 3. Do not sneak up on a dog when he is eating or sleeping
- 4. Do not pet a dog that is playing with a toy
 - Dogs are often protective of toys and may think you are trying to take its' toy.
- 5. Do not pet a dog that is in a car.
 - Dogs will often protect that space.

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- 6. Do not pet a dog that is behind a fence.
 - Once again dogs often protect their territory.

Understanding a dog's body language can help you avoid a dog bite. If a dog is angry or fearful he is most likely to bite. Some signs to look for:

- 1. Angry dogs might want to make themselves look bigger: ears standing up, fur on back standing on end and/or tail straight up (it could be wagging). Teeth could be bared, growling and staring straight at whoever is approaching.
- 2. Frightened dogs may shrink to the ground, put their tail between their legs and/or fold their ears back.

What to do when approached by an unknown dog:

- 1. If you are walking STOP AND STAND STILL (like a tree) with your hands at your side.
- 2. If you are playing on the ground, LIE STILL on the ground (like a log) with your knees tucked into your stomach and your hands over your ears. If you lie still like this the dog will usually sniff you and go away.
- 3. NEVER try to outrun a dog; back away slowly instead. •

If you are bitten by a dog:

- If necessary, call your doctor.
- · Wash the wound gently with soap and water.
- Apply pressure with a clean towel to the injured area to stop any bleeding.
- Apply a sterile bandage to the wound.
- Keep the injury elevated above the level of the heart to slow swelling and prevent infection.
- Report the incident to the proper authority in your community (ie., animal control office or the police).
- Apply antibiotic ointment to the area 2 times every day until it heals.

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Amazing Jake's is located at Collin Creek Mall inside the old Mervyn's. I was expecting glimpses of the old place



Teach Kids to be Financially Successful

Help prepare them for their future

very parent wants to help their children become successful adults. The following ideas will help you teach your children how to become financially successful.

Children should learn the value of money at a young age. To help them learn this you must set up guidelines to help your young children begin to understand financial principles. Do not give children a straight allowance and do not

pay them to clean their room or to do chores they will be regularly expected to do. They will be disappointed when they realize that no one else is going to pay them to pick up after themselves and then they may not do it. One of the best things you can do is to encourage marketable skills. Have discussions with your kids about the activities they are interested in and try to think of ways that these activities can be turned into a business. Many children will want to start their own business and many of them succeed. You may want to go so far as to require your children to work

so many hours a week on gaining marketable skills. Many things fall into this category such as; piano lessons, horseback riding lessons, repairing a bike, playing with a graphics program on the computer, writing stories. Encourage them, but also encourage them to go to school and use the businesses to pay for it. Struggle brings appreciation. Let them know that a college degree is a wise pursuit because there should always be a backup plan and should usually be several. That way they will know if something doesn't work, they haven't failed, they have just opened up a new opportunity for another business venture.

Your children can be successful in their own businesses or working for someone else if they have ingenuity and a little money know-how. You can give that to them and that is something they will appreciate for the rest of their lives. •

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
