COMING UP IN MAY



s Memorial Day 2010 approaches; veterans, their families and friends, community leaders, citizens of Wylie and the citizens of surrounding communities await the unveiling and dedication of Wylie's first Veteran's Memorial.

An idea that began in June of 2008 is soon to become a reality on Monday, May 31, 2010. The Wylie Chamber of Commerce along with the Veterans Memorial Committee will be presenting, as a gift to the city and citizens of Wylie, a Veterans Memorial Monument honoring our local heroes.

The main monument is a 52" high black marble obelisk with all 8 service branches etched in white. Surrounding the monument will be 240 white pave stones etched in black with the rank, name, branch of service, and dates of service of military personnel who have served, who are serving, and who have laid down the ultimate sacrifice.

The day will be marked with military ceremony, the first beginning at 7:30 a.m. with the first Flag Raising over the monument. The Unveiling and Dedication Ceremony will begin at 11:30 a.m. and a Sunset Service is scheduled for approximately 8:15 p.m.

Other events scheduled for the day include a pancake breakfast, a motorcycle rally, a car show, and a picnic in the park. A stage and a dance floor will be set up in the park to provide entertainment from approximately 2:00 - 6:00 p.m. and again from 7:00 - 8:15 p.m.

A real estate agent with Keller Williams for the past 21 years, Lynn Grimes made a decision in November 2007 to bring her love of art more into focus by first lining her real estate office hallways with paintings and by taking oil painting classes taught by renowned artists Bob Bates and Andrew Wages.



Those art classes were the initial stroke of brilliance that lead Grimes to solicit the help of Pat Bentine, friends, coworkers and members of the Wylie Art Society into helping her realize the dream of bringing art to Wylie, Texas.

Ms. Bentine, recently named co-director of the Wylie Art Gallery, is a San Antonio native. She specializes in bluebonnet landscapes on agate quartz rock and has paintings in banks and other businesses throughout London, Venezuela, Washington DC and other cities.

The Wylie Art Gallery site; originally erected in 1963 by Truett Smith housed a bank, Smith Insurance and The Wylie News; all then owned and operated by Smith. In later years the building became Provident Bank and later still Inwood National Bank.

The building, now known as the Q and The Wylie Art Gallery, houses several other businesses in separate offices. These ten-

> ants include a chiropractor, massage and reflexology therapist, a debt collection service company who recently relocated from Plano, and a facial masseuse.

Current building proprietor Bob Heath, who owns an additional six downtown sites, is remodeling and reshaping the former bank location to accommodate the The Wylie Art Gallery and its more than 25 artists who are exhibiting there.

"We are excited to be featuring the work and crafts of many local and talented artists. The gallery will be supplied with a wide range of artistic mediums that will include oils, acrylics, sculpture, pottery and eventually antiques."

Stained glass window artisan and owner of Serenity Glass, Connie

Patton, whose work studio is concealed snugly within the former Inwood Bank's vault, is creating a custom metal and stained glass work that depicts the history of our city to be installed around the beautiful new entrance to the gallery.

Through the diligence of Lynn Grimes, The Wylie Arts Society, and several volunteers; the Wylie Art Gallery has future plans to open its doors to Wylie ISD art students for the exhibition of their work. The idea of displaying Wylie ISD student art pieces expands on the district wide Celebrate the Arts program that occurs annually in March.

This year's celebration of both performing and visual arts is set for March 23 through April 6, 2010. An art show featuring the offerings of all students in grades K-12 is scheduled for March 26 through March 28 at Wylie High School.

According to a profile by the Chicago Sun-Times, Rob used his creativity to improve bland interiors with artifacts pleasing and familiar to older vets. In addition, he designed an outdoor activity center, a gazebo and lake that even disabled veterans could enjoy. He has also been recognized for his design of a POW/MIA monument. This black marble and gray granite structure stands at the entrance of the Geriatric Extended Care Building at the VAMC and simply states, "You are not forgotten." Rob designed the Women's Veteran Monument in North Chicago. Celebrity newscaster Harry Porterfield profiled his contributions to the veterans in his highly touted "Someone You Should Know" series.

Rob has been recognized for his volunteer work and musical career. The North Chicago City Council and Mayor Thomas honored him for his extraordinary efforts. He organized faith-based groups and 350 teen volunteers to paint and repair the homes of 22 senior and disabled residents at no cost to the residents.

Rob's musical talent was well known and he has performed for many city, political, and cultural events. He also performed for Carl Brashear, who was the Navy Master Diver portrayed in the movie "Men of Honor." He has also been recognized as one of the "Music Men of Lake County Illinois" and has performed with the legendary Mavis Staples.

Rob and his wife Debbie moved from Chicago to Wylie in 2004 and opened Ballard School of Performing Arts in Historic Downtown Wylie. He had hoped to continue his musical career in Texas, but an extraordinary event changed his perspective forever. Rob spent a life-changing 10 days performing for the troops and their families at Guantanamo Bay Cuba in January 2005.

Upon his return, Rob began to devote more time and energy to music education for children

and



adults alike in the community. He added music lessons to his store including voice, guitar, violin, percussion and piano lessons as well as children's programs.

An extraordinary opportunity came in 2007 with the creation of the Searching for a Star Foundation. The goal of SFAS is to pass on the irreplaceable gifts of music, dance, theater and visual arts through this non-profit scholarship program. Because of the creation of this foundation. Rob has had a successful stage course and competition for performers in the North Texas area. These young singers will once again vie for overall winner in SFAS 2010

Rob has been guided along his extraordinary path by his Christian faith as well as several important mentors: Elvatus Morris, a mentor, friend, and an original Tuskegee airman; "Granny" Malissa Garrett, whose life was personified by her faith in God, hard work and love for her family; his father, who instilled the love of music in his son; his mother who continually prays; and the support of his loving wife, Debbie.

All in all, an extraordinary second act! •

tray Cat Art Gallery and Tattoo is a refreshing representation of the owner, Daryl Distler, and his passion for art. This clean, bright, welcoming shop celebrates quality works of art from the expected tattoos and piercings to the unexpected vivacious works of artists hanging on the walls and ceilings. This is not your college town tattoo parlor. An industrial garage transformed into an urban loft of sorts, Stray Cat fits nicely into the lake area community.

Daryl began his pursuit of art as a young child drawing and painting. He began an apprenticeship in Oklahoma, a state where tattooing was not exactly legal, but quickly found one where it was legal. After assuming the responsibilities of adulthood and sampling various professions he sought to make a living in a way that he could be passionate about. Art always seemed to be his driving force. On September 5, 2009 Daryl

opened the doors to his dream - a center for art where talented artists could practice their craft and display their talent.

John L. Carter Award Winning Wildlife Artist

the Safari Club International, Dallas and Houston branches of the Safari Club, and many more, including international programs in Europe and Africa.

> The extensive international travel allowed Carter and his wife of 52 years, Bette, to meet people in every situation from mud huts



Carter is an internationally renowned wildlife artist. He has traveled the world to capture images of the big game animals - lions, zebras, elephants, cape buffalo, giraffes – as well as wild hogs, bighorn sheep, elk, cougars, and all kinds of birds. He is especially known for his waterfowl art.

"Some of my work is very personalized," he said. "For example, a client might commission an oil painting and want me to go duck hunting with him to gather everything needed. So we'll go out together on a duck boat. I'll collect information, take video and photographs, and do sketches to capture as many aspects of the wildlife and setting as possible. All of these resources will be used as I create the painting." Carter does water colors, oils, acrylics, bronze sculptures, and wood carvings.

Being a wildlife artist wasn't his original career plan. In the 1960s, Carter was an advertising cartoonist. He enjoyed hunting and painting his own decoys, which were impressive enough to bring him to the attention of a professional wildlife artist. "This artist and my neighbor were going hunting but had forgotten their decoys. I gave them some of mine," Carter said. "When they saw my decoys, the artist wanted to know who had painted them. He told me I should consider doing wildlife art as a career and offered his help. Back then, there were very few people doing wildlife art on a national scale."

Carter learned the techniques and sent samples of his work to Crossroads of Sport, a nationally known New York gallery that specialized in sporting art. "They published my work in their catalog, and my career was born," he said. Soon he was receiving requests to display his art in galleries and shows across the country, including the Easton Waterfowl Festival and the Ward Foundation's exhibits, both in Maryland. His work has been featured in programs sponsored by the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep, the Mzuri Foundation in San Francisco,

to world leaders. "We were fortunate to meet Presidents Reagan and Ford. astronaut Joe Engle, who commanded the second test flight of Columbia in 1981, actors James Brolin, Chuck Connor, and George Peppard, and world leaders such as Ian Smith, Prime Minister of Rhodesia."

He also met Prince Philip of England, an avid hunter and conservationist, who flew the Carters to England in 1980 to present a special award from the

English Game Conservancy.

That was one of dozens of awards garnered during his career. Carter has been named Artist of the Year for many groups -Ducks Unlimited. Texas Quail Forever, and the Dallas Safari Club among them. He is listed in Who's Who in Waterfowl Art.

As a responsible hunter, Carter cares deeply about wildlife and habitat preservation, and he has had opportunities to make a difference. "We've raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to support conservation with donations of my work," he said. "And right here in North Texas there are many organizations that help raise awareness, such as Ducks Unlimited, Quail Forever, the Turkey Federation, and Wild Sheep."

The Carters have lived in Murphy for six years. He is "semiretired" but continues to do commissioned work and stays active in Wildlife Artists International. Most of his limited edition prints are sold out, but some proofs and artists copies are available and can be personalized as needed. Jimmy Nelson His acting career is one of many ups and downs.

hrough it all, the former Collin College student has transformed from an inexperienced actor to a seasoned performer with an Actors Equity card and television appearances on Ugly Betty, Gilmore Girls, Ally

McBeal and The Practice.

And although Nelson's career has slowed since returning to Texas in November, the current Beachbody Coach, who credits his acting career for losing more than 80 pounds, has no regrets about the "path" he took to get to where he is today.

In fact, while recently talking to students in College College's award-winning theatre program, he stresses the importance of "knowing that nobody has the same path."

"I used to get really frustrated with mine and that worked against me. As I look back on it now, I'm very thankful for my path," Nelson, also an off-Broadway actor, said. "I had a lot of life experiences, and that worked well for me."

LIFE EXPERIENCES

These experiences began around 10 years ago when Nelson's nerves almost led to his nonparticipation in his first Collin College play.

"I eventually got on stage, rattled off a bad monologue, said 'thank you' and ran out of there as fast as I could," Nelson, the former Teen Talk co-host. posted callbacks and I was on the list. what it takes to become a successful actor. That was the coolest thing to me."

It was also then when Nelson realized that he had the chops to become an actor.

Two years later, Nelson left Collin College's Theatre Program, which consistently ranks among the nation's elite, to attend Oklahoma University on a theatre scholarship.

Unfortunately, lack of finances forced him to leave after one semester.

But not before learning about a Disney College program, which led to a role as gangster Mugsy Toccata on the Great Movie Ride at Walt Disney World, where he stayed for two years. Upon leaving Walt Disney World, Nelson attended Rollins College, a private school outside of Orlando.

Just like at OU, however, lack of finances forced him to leave the institution after one semester. By this time, Nelson says, his frustration with his acting career was growing.

> Still, he moved to California to further his acting career, which also includes appearances in television commercials for Toyota, Nokia, Chuck E. Cheese, Doritos, American Singles, Radio Shack, Old Navy and more.

> Again, though, financial trouble rained on Nelson's parade, forcing him to move back to Texas.

> "I was ready to give it all up and do something else," he added. "I was like, 'God doesn't want me to be an actor' ... this just isn't working out."

THE TURNING POINT

Fortunately, things quickly turned around for Nelson after coming home. He landed a steady acting job, met his future wife and got an agent.

He and his wife also moved to New York. There, while his wife was away on a Barney tour, Nelson auditioned for work every day until he landed work on Ugly Betty, which helped earn his SAG Card.

"As an actor, you have to be willing to work every day, even on days you are not in a show, because it's really easy to go a long time between jobs. You have to do something in between to learn and grow," Nelson, who moved back to Texas again in November, said. "What I loved most

about New York was the training. Even if I didn't do a ton of shows, I did workshops, musicals, off Broadway shows and television work."

None of this, Nelson admits, would be possible if not for the Collin College Theatre Program and Brad Baker, theatre program chair.

"I wouldn't be an actor if it were not for Collin College and Professor Baker, Through all of my college stops, I still feel like I got the best training here," Nelson said. "The hands-on experiences that I got at Collin College, and the fact that I was required to do a little bit of everything, are so great."

Breast Cancer Awareness

Early Detection Saves Lives by Jenevieve Hughes, MD

ther than skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer among women in this country. But there's good news, too. The American Cancer Society reports that the overall five-year survival rate for localized breast cancer is extremely high, 98 percent. The main reason? Early detection.

Women who undergo regular screening are typically diagnosed at earlier stages of breast cancer, when it's much more treatable. Routine breast cancer screening should include a combination of breast self-examination, clinical breast examination by a physician, and digital or conventional mammography.

Screening Begins at Home

Monthly breast self-exams are recommended for all women. Self-exams are easy to learn and require just a few minutes once a month. The key is becoming familiar with your own body so that you can detect any changes to your breast tissue.

Self-exams help you notice differences over time, and you can examine your breasts more frequently than your doctor can. Symptoms of breast can-

cer include lumps, nipple discharge, breast pain, or skin changes such as redness, thickening, or an orange peel–like appearance of the breast. But since many women don't present any symptoms at all, routine screening is essential. If you feel a change or new mass in your breast, it should be evaluated by your doctor.

Routine Screening Means Seeing Your Doctor

If you're a woman in your 20s or 30s, then your doctor should perform a clinical breast exam at least once every three years. Most guidelines recommend annual clinical exams and mammograms for women of average risk beginning at age 40.

If you have a family history of breast cancer or other highrisk factors, you may need more frequent screenings. Your doctor can assess your level of risk and make a personalized recommendation for when to begin screening, how often to be screened, and which screening techniques should be used.

A mammogram — an x-ray of the breast — is currently the best available screening method for early detection. The latest technology — digital mammography — uses less radiation than film mammography, and studies show it improves cancer detection in women under 50 and patients with dense breasts.

Become Educated, Become Empowered

Sometimes women are hesitant to undergo regular screening because they fear the results. But isn't the unknown far scarier than the known? You should be informed, know your risk for

breast cancer, and understand the risks and benefits of any test you undergo. This knowledge can help you can feel empowered, because significant treatment options offer tremendous hope for anyone diagnosed with breast cancer.

I would encourage you to take an active role in your own health care and develop a close relationship with your doctor. The earlier breast cancer is detected, the better chance for a cure. \bullet

It's All In Your Hands

A Post-Divorce Action Plan for Women

ou have just gone through one of the most challenging and difficult periods that a woman can experience in her life – a divorce. While many things may still be in up in the air, one aspect of your life that you should make sure you're in control of is your finances.

Financial planning for divorced women is not that much different than financial planning for married couples. Several basic elements are the same. The reason that women usually need long-term care insurance more than men is the same reason that retirement income planning for women may be more important. Women live – on average - 5 to 10 years longer than men. Eighty-five percent of people over 100 are women. This means a woman's retirement savings must, on average, be stretched out over a larger number of years.

While, in general, retirement planning for a single person is easier in many ways than for a couple, remember ... you can no longer rely on a spouse's financial resources if a mistake is made. It's important to review your social security estimates, any pensions you have and your retirement assets. You can then compare that to the kind of lifestyle you would like to have during retirement.

Because retirement may be more expensive, you may want to make an employer-sponsored retirement plan a larger deciding factor in any job search. Also, you may decide that you must retire at a later date than you had originally planned.

> Update your beneficiaries and consider using a trust to help manage your assets. People often forget to update the beneficiaries of their life insurance and retirement accounts after a divorce. If not changed, your ex-husband may stand to inherit a large portion of your assets. Also, the estate laws give certain breaks to married couples that are not available to a single person. Establishing the proper type of legal trust may be a way to pass along more of your assets to your heirs, rather than to the IRS.

Finally, after you have moved on from your divorce there may

come a time when you consider remarriage. It's important that you understand the financial effects this may have. If you were married longer than 10 years you may be collecting or entitled to 50% of your ex-husband's social security benefit. If you remarry you will no longer have that right. While you will become entitled to your new husband's benefit, you must know if your new husband's benefit will be lower or higher, and how that will affect your retirement.

Remarriage can also lead to blended families, blended assets and blended income. Your new husband may have his own family from a previous relationship. A financial professional can help the two of you prepare for this blending that satisfies the financial needs of each of you, as well as your new family.
