





first baptist wylie

irst Baptist Church of Wylie has a rich history in the community and just celebrated its 140th anniversary in 2010. FBCW has experienced significant growth, doubling in the last five years. In keeping with the ever growing tri-county region, FBCW recently added over 41,500 square feet to its complex. Located in the heart of the city, the church continues to equip people to know and follow Christ. Lead Pastor, Dr. Kris Segrest, feels that FBCW now looks to the future, claiming Isaiah 43:19: "For I am about to do something new. See, I have already begun! Do you not see it? I will make a pathway through the wilderness. I will create rivers in the dry wasteland."

Kris, how has the greater Wylie community changed in the last five years?


Despite recent economic events, this tri-county area has continued to grow up to 170% in the past decade. Wylie proper has grown from a community of 35,000 people to nearly 43,000. Most people in this community, like people at FBCW, have been in this region less than five years. I believe this influx of people has brought a beautiful diversity, while maintaining a community feel.

Where do you see the Church today?

I think this is a great question every church must answer. The Church, corporately in America, is floundering and not helping people find authentic faith. Most churches are set-up to be "attractional" destinations. This approach is not working for families. Divorce is still high and students who leave after graduation never to come back through the doors of the Church. All Churches must become missional centers of equipping: helping individuals and families to learn how to walk with Jesus personally.

In simple terms, what should a Church be doing?

The Church must become the radical Body of Believers it was intended to become. My job as pastor is to clearly preach Christ as He is portrayed in the Bible. Three priorities jump out as essentials to leading people biblically. First, we must come to Christ as our Lord and Savior on His terms. Too many try to make Christ into someone he is not. Christ told people it would be difficult to follow Him. Easy 'believe-ism' has given many people a false eternal security and a lack of fulfillment. Next, Christians need to recapture the exclusivity of Christ. Christ said He is the only way people go to Heaven. If this claim is offen-

sive, it's not my claim, it is His. Knowing Christ is the only way to Heaven ought to motivate believers in Christ to share the Gospel with others. Third, the Church must take care of the destitute and marginalized in our world because these are the people Christ identified with personally and in His ministry. Essentially, the church must make disciples. In other words, as we make disciples we are made into disciples.

What are some of the unique challenges for FBC Wylie?

Our greatest challenge is simply overcoming the stereotypes about a "First Baptist Church". Many see our church with its big steeple and traditional facade and have a misconception of what is awaiting them behind the doors. Some think we are an old congregation or really traditional. The truth is FBC Wylie is a young church with the average age of 33; on Sunday, 51% of our congregation is under the age of 18. I like to say, "It's not your grandma's church, unless it is." Unapologetically, we believe in the timeless truths of Christ as revealed by the Bible. However, our methods, like Christ's, are progressive to meet people where they are. We value innovation.

What would you want people to know about FBC Wylie?

FBCW is not a perfect church. No church is. However, you will find authenticity at FBCW. It is made up of people from every age group, walk of life, race, and interest, united through their relationships with Christ and joined to one another as His Body. Come and check out FBCW. You will find a loving, friendly group of people who want you to know God and grow in Him.

Chad Womack (Missions), Sandy Stroud (Preschool) and Scott Phillips (Children's) were asked the question: What innovative methods does FBCW use to reach people for Christ, and how is FBCW working to equip believers today?

Chad quickly mentions a very unique ministry tool: the Polar Express ice cream truck! "When the Polar Express is out in the community, the ice

cream is absolutely free. Over the past four years, we have witnessed many people come to Christ at events in which the Polar Express was a part. Another great tool is our inflatable ministry, which we use at block parties and community events. We seek to share Christ through servant evangelism projects: such as Mission Wylie, gas buy downs, stamp give away at tax time and hosting Bible Clubs."

Sandy shared that the Preschool Ministry "equips parents first, then is designed to meet the needs of children ages birth through kindergarten. It is a cooperative effort between the home and church, as parents and staff team up to teach preschoolers about Jesus." A child's preschool years are vital to their "first faith steps".

Scott expresses that the Grade Level Children's Ministry believes in "equipping kids with the confidence and ability to articulately defend their faith, with boldness and courage."

Landscaping 101

ood landscaping is one of the most cost-effective ways to customize a home to meet your needs and tastes, it will also add value to your home and enhance your lifestyle.

First impressions, as anyone in the dating game will tell you, are key. So before you start designing that luxurious backyard koi pond, get the front of your house in order: mowing, weeding, trimming shrubs, and putting in fresh sod if it's needed. If you have a budget, it's important to focus your landscaping around key areas. Something that's going to be viewed a lot, like your front yard. When the "no-brainers" are done, then you can start getting serious. Not only can an overgrown landscape give the impression of an unkempt home, it can also scare away potential buyers should you ever put your home on the market.

The winter months are a good time to plan your spring gardens or landscape. Always select plants that will do well in our climate. Think about ways

to combine plants and flowers, be sure to consider plant size, color, and water requirements. You want to place tall plants in the back, mid-size plants in the middle, and trailing plants in the front. When choosing plant material always read the plant label for height, spread, and light requirements. For beginners it is important to draw a garden layout plan, make your mistakes on paper. In your design, choose plants that are suitable for the site (sun vs. shade), arrange plants according to their height, form, color and texture. I highly recommend using native plants

& well-adapted plants. These plants are accustomed to our hot, dry summers and unpredictable winters. Native plants can require up to 80% less water than nonadapted plants. This means if local watering restrictions are imposed, there will be less impact on your plants and you will spend less money replacing them.

If you are a beginner or an experienced Do-It-Yourselfer, an excellent reference for

plants & trees that work well in our area, and even some that don't or shouldn't even be planted, is John Howard Garret's "Plants of the Metroplex". I'm not trying to sell books for Mr. Garrett, but this is a simply written, alphabetical listing of everything from trees to annual color with a picture of each plant along with a brief and useful bio, it is an excellent source of information and a great place to start for selecting plants.



When it comes to planting, good soil is the foundation on which you build a good garden. And building good soil involves analyzing what you've got and supplementing what it needs. Along with organic matter, or humus, there are three primary minerals that make up soil: sand, clay, and silt. The right balance of both organic matter and minerals will achieve garden loam, which is the best soil for growing plants. Soil that has too much clay will cause problems by holding water and being too dense and wet to work. Not to mention hard as a rock when it's dry, as

> most of us have experienced. Too sandy or silty soil will allow water and nutrients to run through the ground too quickly to be absorbed.

How do you know what you have? Pick up a handful and squeeze gently: if it feels sticky

and stays in a tight mass, it is likely too high in clay. If it feels harsh or gritty and won't hold any shape, it is likely too high in sand. If it feels smooth or floury and won't hold any shape, it is likely too high in silt. If it molds into your hand yet crumbles when squeezed, it has the perfect texture. It is loam, sweet loam!

The very best you can do for your plants is to build deep, high quality soil. A minimum depth of 6 inches of good soil is desirable, but 12 to 18 inches is preferable. There

are many wonderful composts and soil conditioners avail-

able. Incorporating generous amounts into planting beds to

improve soil quality will reward your landscape with a larger

reservoir of moisture-holding, and nutrient rich matter.

Once finished with the installation of your new landscape, you must protect it with mulch. Mulch is material placed over the soil surface to maintain moisture and improve soil conditions. Mulching is one of the most beneficial things you can do for the health of your landscape. Mulch will reduce water loss from the soil, minimize weed competition, and improve soil structure. Plus, properly applied, mulch can give your landscape a handsome, well-groomed appearance. A layer at least three to four inches thick should be

maintained at all times around plants and trees. Replenish as often as you can, since organic matter decomposes.

If you're still not sure where or how to begin, take a walk. Walk or drive though your neighborhood, or even a different neighborhood, and see what other people have done. Bring your camera along so you can take pictures of things that you like, or that give you the inspiration you are looking for to help get the creative juices flowing. •

A World Apart

ylie is known for its proximity to the lakes and recreational water activities, but another body of water is quickly being discovered. Winding through the eastern edge of Wylie, a five and half mile stretch of the East Fork of the Trinity River connects Lake Lavon to the north and Lake Ray Hubbard to the south. Hickory, Willow, Sycamore, Juniper, Mesquite, Elm, Ash, Live Oak, and Pecan trees, as well as a wide variety of indigenous ground cover and vegetation flourish in the rich clay and sandy loam soils. A variety of insects and animals take refuge in this lush river bottomland that Caddo Indians once floated on trade routes.

"This section of the trinity watershed is a personal favorite—one of the most scenic rivers in North Texas. At nearly every bend there is something new," says B.J. Taylor, Dallas resident and avid kayaker who has paddled streams and rivers throughout Texas. "The water clarity is the best I've experienced east of Fort Worth.

There's also plenty of wildlife along this stretch--reptiles, amphibians, insects, birds and rumors of beavers. But if you get out there early enough you may even spot a coyote, bobcat or feral pig."

In July, the Yellow Mexican Water Lily bloom to the size of basketballs until the petals fall off near the end of August. Lily pads grow to more than three feet in diameter. In the spring, many different species of wild-flower can be seen from the river. The native hibiscus grows only in the Trinity River Watershed. The river channel is home to many birds such as the Great Blue Heron, Snowy Egret, Cattle Egret, Red Tailed Hawk and Kingfishers. Migrating birds including Cormorants, Coots and Grebes stop over for the winter in the northern part of Lake Ray Hubbard.

The East Fork of the Trinity River appears tranquil and calm, but Wylie Fire Chief Randy Corbin reminds residents that several people have drowned or required rescue while trying to navigate the East Fork, "Even though





it is close to civilization, the area between Lake Lavon and Lake Ray Hubbard is a confusing, vast area of thick vegetation and changing river channels. During periods of rain the river becomes swift, leaving its banks, making it difficult to navigate. Rescues are very challenging and dangerous...it's hard to locate people and rescues can take hours."

A trip to the upper Colorado River near Kremling in May of 2002, with Dallas artist Steven Shores, started B.J.'s obsession with rivers, fly fishing and exploring as many bodies of water as he could. When they weren't

in the Rockies, B.J. and Steven would explore rivers in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. "A guided trip with Trinity River Expeditions guide Charles Allen down the main stem of the Trinity River through downtown Dallas opened my eyes to the beauty of the Trinity River, debunking local belief that it's full of garbage and waste," says B.J. "But let 'em keep thinking that — more open water for us to enjoy."

s the days get longer and the weather begins to warm many of us in Wylie and surrounding areas begin to look for ways to spend more time out of doors. The solution for not replacing the batteries in the remote may be found right in our own backyard in the form of Lavon Lake.

This U.S. Army Corps of Engineers reservoir's primary purpose is to provide water to over 1.5 million people as well as flood control but it also provides a wide variety of recreational opportunities. With sixteen parks, nineteen four lane boat ramps, six thousand five hundred acres of public hunting, camping, two hundred forty four picnic tables, hiking trails, horseback riding trails and of course fishing, boating, and all the water sports this twenty two thousand acre play ground has something for everyone.

Collin Park, one of the three privately operated parks, has a large marina, swimming area, campsites with full hookups. Lavon Water Sports providing boat and jet ski rentals, and The Harbor House which is the only restaurant on the lake.

Brockdale Park is home to the Blackland Prairie Raptor Center dedicated to preservation and conservation of birds of prev. A great way to spend the day is at one of their special events. You can learn more about them at www.bpraptorcenter.org.

If high flying remote control airplanes excite you, check out the Richardson Radio Control Club (www.rrcc.org) at Bratonia Park, located on the north end of the lake in Princeton.

With all the various ways to have fun on Lavon Lake, the main attraction is still the excellent fishing and Spring can be the best time to try your luck.

While very little aquatic vegetation grows in Lavon Lake, when the dam was raised to its current level in 1974 most of the timber was left standing on the north end of both arms of

the lake to create habitat for the many aquatic species. Many of the creeks on the north end of the lake become spawning grounds for white and stripped bass and the crappie will be close to standing timber in the shallow coves offering bank fisherman and those willing to get their feet a little wet excellent opportunities.

If competition and a sophisticated boat are more your style, the Christian Anglers Bass Association will be hosting largemouth bass tournaments every Thursday evening at Avalon Park starting March 17th.

This is a cat fisherman's paradise - with an abundance of blue. channel and flathead catfish, Lavon may be one of the best fishing destinations in the area.

For a fun family outing of fishing you may want to try East Fork park. The east side of the park has a shallow cove that will be a spawning ground for several fish species. Here minnows, small jigs, and road runners (each a type of bait) may get your line stretched. The main lake side has some points with deeper water that may yield catfish, white bass and stripers.

If you really want to see a kid's face light up, buy a small cast net and throw around the boat launches early in the morning then use the shad as bait. As always, make sure you have the proper fishing license even if you are just assisting a minor.

With only one restaurant and two marinas on the water and no major highways close, Lavon is much less crowded than many of the other area urban lakes, making it a great place to get away for only an hour or to even spend a vacation. Many of the parks are accessible at no fee and the others are very low cost making Lavon Lake a great place to relax and enjoy the area while staying close to home. •

he weather has warmed and we are all preparing for spring flowers and lush green lawns. As a homeowner I am excited about planting my spring color but wonder what my role is in conserving water. So, I contact the North Texas Municipal Water District who directs me to www.WaterlQ.org. This water conservation awareness campaign provides helpful information specific to a resident's zip code.

A few tips really jump out at me. Firstly, grass maintained at about three inches holds more water and stays lusher. When mowing, leave the clippings to help hold in the water. Plants that require more water, like my spring color, should be watered by hose or watering can where water can be directed to exactly where it is needed. A rain barrel or a cistern, collecting water from gutters, can be a resourceful way to reuse a natural resource. Lastly, don't run a sprinkler system when it is raining. This seems obvious but if the system is set up to automatically run it is easy to forget to switch it off. A rain shutoff devise can help keep your automatic system from watering when it's raining.

These tips make me feel pretty good about conserving water in the spring months but I have to admit once the Texas heat takes us into drought I'm not so sure I'm willing to let my lawn dry and my foundation crack. Dan Hargrave of Hargrave Custom Foundation Repair says, "Inconsistency in soil moisture around your home's foundation creates problems. Avoiding extremely wet or dry soil around one's foundation is the key to a stable foundation." He suggests soil around the foundation should be moist enough to clump into a ball but not soggy.

Ted Nichols, of Focal Point Landscaping, agrees that water around one's home needs to be managed and evenly distributed. The biggest mistake he sees is when homes are only 10-12 feet apart, neighbors over-water each other's side yards. The side yards get such little sun and with both neighbors watering the soil stays saturated. The side yards need about half the watering time than the front and back yards. Also, gutters protect the soil surrounding the house from erosion. Gutter water needs to be drained away from the house. Again, side yards tend to collect this water and create an area of big concern.

In all cases, the experts agree that soaker hoses placed a few inches from the foundation are the best way to protect your home's foundation. Sprinkler systems are for lawns and landscape, not to water your foundation. Sprinkler systems distribute various volumes of water. According to www.WaterIQ. com, "One inch of water per week in the summer will keep

most Texas grasses healthy. To determine how long you should run your sprinklers, place straight-edged cans at different distances away from the sprinkler and time how long it takes to fill an average of 1 inch of water in each can. That's a pretty practical tip that I can put into use. Most of us run our sprinklers while we are asleep so we rarely notice if water is going astray. Sprinkler heads are easy to damage or get misaligned so it is important to get them assessed at least once a year.

Sprinkler systems can also be designed with drip irrigation in mind. This method of slow dripping water, directly at the plant's roots, provides a watering option that reduces water evaporation. This highly efficient use of water reduces nutrient loss and erosion, offering an overall healthy option for a home owner's landscape. Systems can be retrofitted to utilize this water saving method but the cost can be the same as a newly installed system. This cost might be a deterrent for some, but with all of us conscious of conserving our water resources, it just might be worth replacing some of the pop-up spray heads with drip irrigation.

With just a little bit of information gathering, I feel better about protecting my home and landscape while actively engaging in water conservation. A few changes, in my watering tools and habits, can help me protect my home's foundation and the spring color I'm eager to install. •

Spring is here!

Yippee!! Warmer days and flowers are just around the corner. Spring is the best time of the year for curb appeal. Did you know that you only have about 15 seconds to make an impression on buyers? Just this weekend we were working in the yard for a few hours (my back is feeling it) and what a wonderful improvement. The Garden at Achieve Academy

pring is a time of renewal and rebirth. Gardens across the city will soon be cleaned, tilled and sowed with a wide variety of vegetation in hopes of colorful, fragrant and often, appetizing yields. In Wylie ISD, one special garden provides vegetables for senior citizens and is also a learning tool for stu-

dents. This ritual of spring is carried out as the students of the Achieve Academy cultivate their own campus garden.

Funded by a Wylie ISD Education Foundation grant, "The Garden", was supplied and built in 2007. It consists of raised garden beds and a greenhouse. Students attending some of the several programs offered at Achieve have tended to the spot at the direction of Special Education Aide Joyce Thursby.

When it's time to till, plant, weed, fertilize or water, campus teachers receive an e-mail advising them of the garden's status. They, in turn, incorporate the required activity into the day's instruction.

"Classes usually work the garden as part of a physical education requirement," said Achieve Principal Lynne Tinsley. "Working the garden is an excellent therapy tool as well, and students get a sense of purpose from the gardening activities."

Although, actual planting won't begin until late March, students are currently busy getting the garden area ready. Children from the elementary BAU

(Behavioral Adjustment Unit) are nurturing plants including beans, tomatoes, spinach and lettuce in the classrooms. Most of the beds have been turned to mix the dead plant matter into the soil and allow oxygen in.

"The students will wait until after Easter to transfer the nurtured plants along with seed plants," said Ms. Thursby. "We also

have an herb garden with perennials like rosemary, oregano and thyme, well underway."

Early or late occurrences of frost have taken their toll on the school's crop. In previous years, the students planted too soon and lost herbs and produce when the dreaded pre-Easter frost

"We also lost the most amazing crop of tomatoes when we got an early frost this past November," said Principal Tinsley. "So we continue to experiment with when and how to plant, looking for the right combination."

All the hours spent cleaning, tilling, sowing, fertilizing and harvesting don't go to waste. Students are eager to share the "fruits" of their labor. In addition to family and friends, Achieve plans to donate some of its produce and herbs to local senior citizens.

The Achieve Academy garden is a happy, pleasant place where students learn the joy of actually growing and nurturing food items. It provides a sense of responsibility to these learners as they experience how lack of care, time and planning can affect their crop negatively. They also experience the positive sense of doing a great job and yielding bounty for themselves and others. •



Mounir Errami Wins Innocentive Top Solver Award

ounir Errami is a problem solver. Only, the problems this Collin College biology and bioinformatics professor solves are large. How big, you ask?

Challenging enough to where he once discovered a method to diagnose infections in a hospital setting without the need to amplify the pathogen agent or to make biochemical tests.

Errami's solution to this problem was acquired by a multi-billion-dollar life science company and will help save healthcare costs because patients will not be kept in the ER until their infection is identified. Instead, the best possible course of treatment will be available within minutes after the sample has been analyzed.

Such an innovation is why Errami won the Innocentive Top Solver award last year and was recently featured in Nature, a prestigious scientific journal.

"Being named in what many consider one of the most prestigious scientific journals is quite an achievement in itself," Errami expressed. "For scientists and engineers, this is one of the most important currency to advancing one's career. As a biology and chemistry professor, it brings some recognition among my peers and colleagues. It also gets my name out there, which helps to network and come up with new, innovative ideas and projects to work on."

INNOVATION AT ITS BEST

To receive this honor, Innocentive taps into a pool of more than 200,000 scientists and engineers worldwide who solve various challenges for companies and nonprofit organizations.

Each year, Errami explains, solvers who distinguish themselves on the basis of the difficulty of a problem solved and the number of problems solved are the recipients of the Innocentive Top Solver award.

According to Errami, this award was given in 2009 to only 12 individuals from five different countries.

"This recognition is on an international scale for the spirit of innovation and ingenuity showed to solve problems that some-

times multi-billion dollar companies had difficulties solving," Errami said. "Truly, the big winners are the companies because they have access to a large talent pool, brilliant minds and experts working on the problem for the amount of money it would take to pay a single one of them and they get the best possible solution."

For example, Errami was challenged to discover a new method to localize a drug in the retina.

This is important, he explains, because when it comes to ophthalmologic treatments, there is the need to know if the prescribed drug goes where it is supposed to and if its concentration pattern within the retina is in line with treatment guidelines.

"This kind of technology is lacking and is crucial to every day practice and clinical trial settings," Errami added. "I hope that this technology will help advance treatments related to retina diseases."

PROBLEMS SOLVED HAVE POSITIVE IMPACT

He also hopes that the problems he solves continue to have a positive impact.

"When you get to work on intellectually stimulating and exciting problems that you know were unsolved by the 'seeker,' there is the thrill of winning and the feeling that, at least for that problem, you were the best," Errami said. "There is a feeling of making a difference and bringing a contribution with a direct impact."

This is also why Errami loves teaching at Collin College. "When I get in the classroom, I also always try to broaden the course behind the basic topics taught. I insist on the fact that we provide students knowledge," Errami said. "Science should be aimed at innovation and technological advances. Of course, basic science is the primary drive of innovation, but it is not always directly applicable to a particular issue of our world."

Allergies are Nothing to Sneeze About

ore than 50 million people suffer from allergies each year, which are among the most common health problems. Sufferers include those with asthma, seasonal hay fever and other allergy-related conditions. Allergies can affect anyone, regardless of age, socioeconomic class, race, or gender. Although allergies are more common in children, they can occur at any age and have a tendency to occur in families. Symptoms include sneezing, congestion, runny nose, itchy nose, throat, eyes and ears, nosebleeds, and clear drainage from the nose. Allergies can by diagnosed through skin testing and blood tests.

Types of Allergies

Some people have outdoor or seasonal allergies, such as hay fever, which exhibit themselves during specific times of the year. Tree, grass and weed pollens are common seasonal allergies. Other people

suffer from indoor or perennial allergies which present symptoms throughout the year. These allergies include house dust mites, indoor molds, animal dander and occupational allergies. Children with perennial allergies may also have recurrent ear infections, snoring, mouth breathing, fatigue, and poor performance in school. Other types of allergies include skin allergies, latex allergies, insect allergies, eye allergies, drug allergies, and food allergies.

Nearly 5 percent of children under the age of five years, and 18 percent under the age of 18 years, have food allergies. Eggs, milk and peanuts are the most common causes, but wheat, soy, and tree nuts can also cause allergic reactions. Symptoms of food allergies include vomiting, diarrhea, hives, swelling of the lips, tongue, or mouth, difficulty breathing, wheezing, and lowered blood pressure. Symptoms of milk and soy allergies in infants and young children include colic or fussiness, blood in the stool, or poor growth. Food allergies, unlike food intolerance which may have some of the same symptoms, affect the immune system and can be life threatening.

How to Avoid and Prevent Allergies

One of the best ways to avoid or prevent allergies is to control your environment and reduce exposure to potential allergycausing substances. This may require you to stay indoors as much as possible during times when the offending allergen is at its seasonal peak. Other measures include enclosing mattresses or pillows with allergen-proof casings, and eliminating carpeting. It might also include avoiding areas where there is heavy dust, mites, and molds, and avoiding pets. For food allergies, the goal is to avoid foods that cause the symptoms and other

similar foods in that food groups. Breastfeeding moms should avoid foods in their diet to which their child is allergic.

When these measures fail, pharmaceutical treatment is appropriate and includes antihistamines, nasal decongestants, intranasal steroids, and cromolyn sulfate, which is used to control the symptoms of asthma by decreasing the narrowing of the lung and the chance of fluid in the lung. Immunotherapy or allergy shots may also be given to control symptoms. •

Naming Beneficiaries

of Insurance Policies and Retirement Plans

hether you're wealthy or earn a modest income, there is one estate planning concern that is shared by people from all walks of life-the decision of who gets what when you're gone. While some individuals logically assume that a will is the only official forum to express such decisions, that's not always the case. Often, an equally important issue in estate planning is who to name as beneficiary on life insurance policies, employer-sponsored retirement plan accounts and IRAs.

Life Insurance

No matter who is designated, the beneficiaries will receive the death benefit proceeds income tax free. Unlike property disposed of in a will. if the beneficiary designation form is properly completed, insurance proceeds do not go through probate.

For many married individuals, a spouse will be the most logical beneficiary. A trust may be a prudent beneficiary choice, however, if a surviving spouse would not have the ability to prudently manage a large sum of money. The

trustees (often a legal entity rather than an individual) would then take charge of managing, investing and disbursing the policy proceeds for the benefit of the surviving spouse.

Be sure to name contingent or secondary beneficiaries. This means that if the primary beneficiary has died, the insurance proceeds will go to an individual or trust. If there are no surviving beneficiaries, then your beneficiary is generally the "estate of the insured," which means the death benefits end up being probated and ultimately distributed according to the instructions of the decedent's last will and testament. If an individual dies without a valid will (intestate), then the order of legal beneficiaries to whom assets are distributed is specified by that state's law.

Employer-Sponsored Retirement Plans and IRAs

The law requires that a spouse be the primary beneficiary of a 401(k) or profit sharing account unless he or she waives that right in writing. A waiver may make sense in a second marriage—if a new spouse is already financially set or if children from a first marriage are more likely to need the money.

Single people can name whomever they choose as beneficiary, and nonspouse beneficiaries are now eligible for a tax-free transfer to an Individual Retirement Account. The IRS has also issued regulations that dramatically simplify the way certain distributions affect IRA owners and their beneficiaries. Consult your tax advisor on how these rule changes may affect your situation.

Naming Children May Not Be Best


Naming children as beneficiaries may cause unforeseen problems. For example, insurance companies, pension plans and retirement accounts may not pay death benefits to minors. The benefits would likely be held until they could be made to a court-approved guardian or trustee of a children's trust. A guardian, trust or trustee should be named beneficiary to ensure competent management of the proceeds for the children. By naming a children's trust as a beneficiary, for example, the proceeds could be invested and managed by a competent trustee (a person or institution) you choose. A revocable living trust could also be named as a beneficiary, which keeps the proceeds out of probate.

Also keep in mind that the IRS allows nonspousal beneficiaries to annuitize retirement plan distributions over the life of the beneficiary. Check with your employer to find out if this is

> an option under your plan prior to naming a child as a beneficiary. A competent financial professional and tax advisor can also offer guidance as to whether this action may be appropriate for

Keep Your Plan Up-to-Date

When completing overall estate plans and wills, it is imperative to readjust all beneficiary designations so that your estate plan accurately reflects your intentions. Remember, outdated beneficiary designations (e.g., older parents or ex-spouses) could misdirect the intended flow

Also, keep in mind that beneficiaries are paid directly as named. Thus, beneficiary designations are not governed by the wording of wills.

As is always the case with estate planning, consult with qualified professionals concerning your particular situation in order to ensure that your beneficiary designations are in tune with your goals.

When Naming Beneficiaries, Remember to Consider...

- · The age of the beneficiary. Many policies and plans will not directly transfer assets to minors until a trustee or guardian is approved by a court.
- The ability of the beneficiary to manage assets. Perhaps a trust set up in the person's name would be better than a direct transfer.
- Employer-sponsored retirement plans. Unless expressly waived by the spouse in writing, the law requires a spouse to be the primary beneficiary of the account.
- · Naming contingent beneficiaries. Should something happen to your primary beneficiary, the contingent beneficiary would receive your assets. •
