ucked away on the outskirts of Wylie, nestled between Lake Lavon Dam and the Kansas City Southern Railway switching yard, is the home of Wylie's wilder residents. In-Sync Exotics Wildlife Rescue & Educational Center is a 501(c)(3) sanctuary dedicated to the rescue of abused, neglected and unwanted exotic and native cats. Since its inception, In-Sync has provided a safe, nurturing haven to over 40 animals including tigers, lions, leopards, cougars, bobcats, lynx, servals and a coatimundi.

So how did these big felines come to be in Wylie? Fate. In 1991, Vicky Keahey was working at a local veterinary clinic when a young female cougar, who had her front teeth removed, was brought in for medical attention. When it came time for this beautiful cat to go home, no one showed. Luckily for the cougar, Vicky was on duty that day. Never one to turn away a cat in need, Vicky brought home the recovering cougar, and with the help of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, set out to learn everything there is to know about caring for a cougar. Earning the respect of TPWD, Vicky was asked to take in a second cougar that was confiscated from deplorable living conditions. Once again Vicky willingly agreed. Several years later, a series of events led Vicky to a Texas drive-thru park/breeding facility claiming to be a sanctuary where she met a scrawny tiger cub that was sickly, loosing hair and covered in fleas. The tiger was ugly and financially useless to the park's owner but beautiful to Vicky, so she brought her home and named her Kenva.

Kenya opened Vicky's eyes to the realities of captive breeding practices and made her realize there are too many cats in need of homes where they can feel safe, loved and respected. Vicky decided to open her heart and door to more cats, and in 2000 In-Sync Exotics was born.

The cats at In-Sync Exotics are victims of circumstance. Because of "man's" infatuation with wild animals and a desire to interact with animals that would otherwise be untouchable, breeding facilities have thrived. Sadly, there are more tigers in captivity than there are in the wild, a tragedy by any standards. Even more tragic is that many of these magnificent animals, symbols of power, strength and beauty in the wild, are condemned to a life of neglect and abuse by uncaring, greedy people. Others fall into the hands of awe-struck people who are clueless to the needs of exotic cats. And still others fall victim to owners who decide that a 20+ year commitment is more than they bargained for. So as not to contribute to the number of big cats in captivity, In-Sync does not buy, sell, trade or breed our cats.

In-Sync is committed to giving these cats a rich, fulfilling life by providing a nutritious diet, exceptional medical care, ample space to run and play, engaging enrichment, training and behavioral modification and unlimited love. It's an expensive labor of love, but a life these animals

deserve. Since we don't receive any federal funding, we rely on generous donations from our supporters, admission fees, adoption programs, corporate sponsorship, fundraising events and dedicated volunteers to care for our animals.

Partners for Life

Officer Brenda Martin and Carlo

oyal, obedient, friendly, sociable, strong but silent, are just a few of the words Officer Brenda Martin uses to describe Carlo, the City of Wylie's K-9 and Martin's partner on the street. Their story began more than nine and a half years ago when Martin was selected to be Wylie's first K-9 handler.

The City contracted with Garland K-9 Officer and consultant Dennis Morrow to help with the selection of a dog that was right for the department and one that was a good fit for Martin's personality. Jeff Butters, Assistant City Manager and former Police Chief re-counted with a smile how he described Martin to Morrow, "Talkative, outgoing and a little ornery."

Carlo was handpicked from Czechoslovakia and the match has been an obvious success, forming one of the most decorated K-9 units in the State of Texas. The pair was awarded Top Dog and Best Overall Team at the 2005 Region 20 United States Police Canine Association Certification Trials and numerous second and third place finishes

throughout the years. Carlo has also been instrumental in an untold number of drug detections and suspect apprehensions.

"Carlo has been a tremendous asset to the Wylie Police Department," said Butters. "He gives us the ability to quickly deploy a search and tracking component that we didn't have before the K-9 unit. He is an important and beloved part of the Police Department family."

K-9's use their keen sense of smell to track criminals, sniff out illegal materials, search buildings, and do other jobs human police officers can't do as well or are too dangerous for a human to perform. A dog's sense of smell is not only 50 times more sensitive than a human's, but it is also very selective. They have the ability to discern a specific scent even when there are dozens of other scents present.

A good nose is not a K-9's only advantage. The simple presence of Carlo or his intimidating growl motivates many criminals to surrender peacefully, instead of running or fighting. When a conflict does arise, dogs are faster and stronger than most humans, able to catch a fleeing criminal and clamp down with powerful jaws to apprehend the suspect until other officers arrive.

Martin says that Carlo is more than just a





partner on the street. He is an inseparable friend for life. Since day one he became a member of Martin's family that includes Angel, a Himalayan/Siamese cat Martin rescued from a house while on the job; Midnight, a large black barn cat; and Tasha, an eleven year old German Shepherd adopted from the Garland Animal Shelter.

Carlo quickly learned his place in the family. Tasha is the boss at home and handles backyard security. When strangers are walking down the Alley, Tasha is there to inspect while Carlo relaxes on the porch or in the doghouse. He obviously learned to leave his work at the office. While Tasha handles backyard security, Midnight is in charge of the house. After a hard days work, upon arriving at home, Carlo has to acknowledge Midnight's presence in the doorway before he is allowed to enter the house.

Each morning when Carlo hears the sounds of Martin preparing for duty, he runs in circles, anticipating the days work. But after more than nine and a half years of service, Carlo is nearing retirement, exceeding the average length of service for a K-9 by more than four years.



Martin says she dreads the day that she will have to explain to Carlo that he is not going to work anymore. But that day may be more challenging for Martin. When asked how she will feel without Carlo by her side, all Martin could say with emotion in her voice is, "It will be a sad day, a very sad day." •

quick Internet search reveals more than 50 career paths for students who major in agriculture in college. Agribusiness, plant pathology, aquatic science, tree surgery, ecology, landscape architecture, horticulture, agriculture technology, forestry and veterinary medicine are only a few of the growing number of opportunities for students who choose a major in an agricultural field. As the world's population grows, weather patterns change and water becomes scarcer, agriculture is big business.

before the end of the season when the final event is the Show and Sale here in Wylie.

The Show and Sale is a much anticipated community event each spring. It lasts several days and all WISD agriculture and FFA students show their animals to large crowds of people. During the live auction, students sell their goats, pigs, roosters, lambs, calves and other animals. Bidding can go very high and helps students defray the costs of raising and showing their stock. The Show and Sale is a fun, family event that is enjoyed by all ages.

Agriculture students participate year round in out-of-class activities such as summer lake

outings and green hand events. Cutting Horses

Incredibly athletic and smart

or most of us, sports are about the four major leagues of the American sporting landscape, Major League Baseball, the NHL, NBA, and the NFL. We cheer for the Rangers, Stars, Mavericks, and of course, the Cowboys.

But one local family with strong ties to the Wylie community are themselves "cowboys". Engaging in a sport founded in Texas and the Southwest and making their way on one of the most magnificent of animals, the cutting horse.

Located between Lavon and Royse City, RRS Farms was founded in the 50's by Wylie High School graduate Bobby Smith and his wife, Ann. She was raised on the nearby RR Farm which was founded in the 40's. The Smith children include sister Robin, brothers Randy and Ronnie, their wives (Cindy and Beth) and their children, the initials of which are all "RRS", and many with ties to Wylie.

According to the National Cutting Horse Association (NCHA), cutting is a sport, the origins of which stem from the cattle ranches of the 1880s. Branding cattle or separating them for sale or treatment for sickness, ranchers developed cutting horses which were trained to prevent the separated cow from doing what came naturally, returning to the herd. Ranchers looked for horses that were alert and that could anticipate a cow's moves. Soon, cowboys began to compete against each other to test the abilities of their horses, calling the competitions "cuttings".

But don't get the false impression that these horses and their riders are not athletes.

"You use your legs," says Beth Smith who has been riding for family owned RRS Farms since 1997. "If I want the horse to go over to the right, I'm going to push on that horse with my left leg. Once you are out there and competing, it's a rush."

The horses are incredibly athletic, and smart.

"There are times I can just sit up on my horse and she does everything for me," says Beth. "She wants to stop that cow. She doesn't give up. She hates to lose cows."

To read the criterion used by cutting judges, you can see just how athletic the horse must be with high marks awarded to those who show aggressiveness, courage, determination, style and grace when cutting a cow. Sounds like many of the same things Olympic judges look for in gymnastics or ice skating, except for the part about the cow.

Competitors are not permitted to show cutting horses until they reach the age of three years. Much like horse racing, horses that are very successful in the cutting arena over several years are soon thereafter put to stud, more valuable breeding than competing.

At the Wylie Championship Rodeo, held annually in September, RRS Farms cutters present an exhibition just prior to the start of the two day event.

"A lot of people don't know anything about cutting horses," says Randy Smith. "A lot of people don't know how to begin to ride a horse. (The rodeo is) just a time for us to get out there and show another event that isn't included in a rodeo."

Animal Shelters

They handle pets and pests

few months ago, Sandra Potter, Murphy's animal control officer, picked up a Boston Terrier. She was able to reunite him with his owner in Dallas because the dog had a micro-chip in place.

"The strange thing," she said, "was this particular dog had been stolen almost a year ago to the date, and the owner was overwhelmed with joy to get him back. He still had the original collar for his pet. The expression shown by both human and canine makes my job the BEST."

Reuniting lost pets with their owners is a major service of the animal shelters in Murphy, Wylie, and Sachse. The job is much easier when dogs and cats have microchips or tags. "We can't stress enough how important it is to put a collar and tags on your pet," said Katie Munson, Sachse's animal control officer. "That way, whomever finds your pet can help it get back home."

Katie shared one of the Sachse Animal Shelter's success stories. "We brought a sadly neglected purebred schnauzer into the shelter and groomed and advertised

her. The most wonderful family came to see her. Their own schnauzer had passed away, and they took the shelter dog, who was on death's door, to be part of their own loving family. They still send us updates!"

When lost pets are taken into the shelters, they are kept for several days before becoming available for adoption. If you have lost a pet, you should check the shelters' websites and also visit the shelters in person.

Besides making dogs and cats available to adopt, the staff of our animal shelters deal with many other animal control issues. "We handle all animals including goats, equine, cows, snakes, opossum, birds, skunks, rabbits, squirrels, armadillos and many more," said Ken Qualls, Wylie's animal control supervisor. "Many of these animals require humane traps to be set, and we have those available at our facility." Often when wildlife is picked up, it is relocated to areas outside the city where it will be safe.

Sandra Potter noted other services provided: cruelty investigations, deceased animal pick up, issuing City registrations and citations, and public education.

If you are having a problem with nuisance wildlife, call your city's animal control officer. They have the proper training and equipment to safely remove the animal. Katie Munson stressed that citizens should avoid some animals. "Skunks and raccoons are potential rabies carriers," she said.

The best way to help your local shelters is to be familiar with your city's laws and ordinances. You can find information on your city's website. To keep your pets safe, remember to register them, have them spayed or neutered, and stay current with their vaccinations.

You can also help by donating items to the shelters: bleach, newspapers, old towers/blankets, dryer sheets, cat/dog treats, wet food for cats/dogs, new/used collars and leashes (all sizes and colors), new/used crates, carriers, and dog houses. •

How to Treat an Animal Bite

Basic guidelines to follow

hey're usually our furry friends, but domestic animals sometimes turn aggressive without warning. If you are badly bitten by a dog or cat and the wound isn't treated properly, it can lead to an infection.

"The first steps to treat a bite should be to clean the wound with soap and water, and then control any bleeding with pressure with gauze or tow-

els," says Stephen Kim, M.D., a family medicine physician at First Aid Family Care in Wylie. "Apply a sterile dressing with a topical antibiotic."

Dogs are more likely to bite than cats, but cat bites have a higher risk of infection.

"If you were bitten by a cat, I would advise that you get treated by a doctor," Dr. Kim says.

"You should also seek medical attention if the bite was on the hand, foot or head, if the bite shows any signs of infection (such as redness or swelling), or if the bleeding cannot be controlled."

If your last tetanus shot was more than five years ago, your doctor may recommend a booster. Also, you should take precautions

against rabies, even though it is rare in dogs and cats.

"One of the most important things to do after a dog or cat bite is to identify the animal," Dr. Kim says. "If the animal is a stray or if the owner cannot be found, contact animal control or the health department. If the animal looked sick or tested positive for rabies, then your doctor will recommend a series of rabies shots." •

- Do not try to separate fighting animals.
- Avoid sick animals.
- Avoid animals you don't know.
- Leave animals alone while they're eating.
- Keep pets on a leash when in public.
- Select your family pet carefully and be sure to keep your pet's vaccinations up-to-date.

money that she'll be saving due to your generosity. Even if it's just a relatively small amount, every little bit helps. And who knows? Your gift could encourage your mother to take further steps to reduce debt and invest more.

Make an appointment with a financial advisor. If your mother doesn't already work with a professional financial advisor, make an appointment for her to see one, preferably one that comes with good referrals. A reputable financial advisor won't charge anything for an initial consultation, and, over time, he or she can
